


Indigenous heavy water reactor attains criticality

- Unit 7 of the Rajasthan Atomic Power Project attained criticality on Thursday night, marking the start of a controlled fission chain reaction, Nuclear Power Corporation of India Ltd confirmed.
- RAPP-7 is the third reactor in a series of 16 indigenous 700 MW pressurized heavy water reactors being developed by the National Nuclear Establishment.
- - Criticality of the reactor signals the end of the construction phase, and power generation is expected to begin later this year.

DOCTORS TO RESUME WORK FROM TODAY; PROTESTS CONTINUE IN KOLKATA

• - Junior doctors and thousands of civil society activists held a rally in Kolkata, demanding justice for the doctor who was raped and murdered at R.G. Kar Medical College last month.



- The West Bengal Junior Doctors' Front held a march to the CBI office, followed by a 40km torch rally, reaffirming its commitment to restarting emergency services and the ongoing dharnas.
- Three arrests have been made in connection to the case, including the prime suspect, as the community continues to advocate for swift justice for the victim.

DOPPLER WEATHER RADAR

- Electricity generation in India grew 9%, while coal power grew 13% to offset a decline in hydropower generation.
- Coal demand may slow in the future as hydropower generation increases and the coal import ratio falls, although medium-term demand is expected to grow, limited by India's goal of increasing domestic mining by 7% annually until 2030.




MODI ARRIVES AT PRAVASI EVENT HELD IN NEW YORK

- The event, titled 'Modi and the US', included cultural presentations and was aimed at strengthening ties with the Indian community in the U.S., although there were some protests outside the venue.
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi addressed thousands of supporters in Long Island, New York, reflecting on the BJP's electoral performance and celebrating the government's achievements over the past decade.
- He praised the talent and contributions of the Indian diaspora, calling them ambassadors of India, as well as highlighted the government's initiatives in infrastructure and poverty alleviation.

CENTRAL WATER COMMISSION

CENTER TO LAUNCH NEW PROJECT ON URBAN POVERTY ALLEVIATION

- The Central government will launch a three-month pilot programme for urban poverty alleviation in 25 cities from October 1, targeting vulnerable groups in the informal sector.
- The initiative aims to provide access to financial support, social security and credit to micro enterprises to break the cycle of poverty.
- The design of the programme was inspired by suggestions from 28 states and union territories, with a focus on ensuring equitable distribution of benefits of urbanization to marginalized communities.

IN POLL-BOUND MAHARASHTRA, MODI TO FLAG OFF PUNE METRO



- Prime Minister Narendra Modi will inaugurate a new section of the Pune Metro Rail and launch development projects worth over Rs 22,600 crore ahead of the Maharashtra Assembly elections.
- The District Court to Swargate section marks the completion of Phase-1 of the Pune Metro Rail Project, with the underground line estimated to cost Rs 1,810 crore.
- Modi will also lay the foundation stone of the Swargate-Katraj metro extension, which is expected to cost around Rs 2,950 crore.

JOURNAL 'RETRACTS' CONTROVERSIAL PAPER PUBLISHED BY BHU ON COVAXIN SAFETY



- The journal Drug Safety has withdrawn a paper by Banaras Hindu University about the safety of the Covid-19 vaccine Covexin, citing loss of confidence in the study findings due to vague reporting of adverse events.
- The Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) criticized the study design and sought its retraction, while Bharat Biotech filed a defamation suit against the authors and the journal's editor, seeking damages and a permanent injunction against further publication of the flawed studies.
- The original paper has been removed from the journal's website, raising concerns about the potentially chilling effect of the defamation suit on future research.



UN HIGH SWELL CONVENTION
